# From the chair



June Dance 2003

First of all, as this is the last Newsletter before the Branch AGM, and therefore towards the end of my first year 'in the chair', I would like to thank all those who have been such a help to me. Not only the committee members, of whom more later, but the teachers, the event organisers, and all those whose enthusiasm for Scottish dancing has been so infectious.

Welcome back, too, to those who have spent some part of the summer at St Andrew's. No doubt they enjoyed themselves, and I hope they will 'cascade' their newly extended skills and knowledge to the rest of us as the opportunity arises.

I would also thank those who gave us such a good dance, and a good supper, at the summer 'strawberries and cream' dance in June. This is a regular feature of the Leeds Branch year, and long may it continue.

A number of stalwarts will be retiring from the committee at the AGM in October, and I would like to thank them, on everybody's behalf, for their contribution. Alan Carr has completed five years on the

committee, three of them as chairman, and I must say I would have struggled a good had it not been for his constant support, advice, and encouragement. Derek Kendall has been an excellent treasurer, and has pointed out to the committee what needs to be done financially. Adrian McDonald and Val Hall have always done more than their share and will be hard to replace.

Colleagues may wonder why the Branch's constitution is such that good committee members are required to leave after a set period. When the constitution was first drafted, it was felt that it should be written in such a way that there is a measured but regular turn-over of officers and committee members so that the Branch does not get stuck in a rut. When the constitution working party recently put forward a revision for consideration at the AGM this year, it agreed with this basic principle, while making some adjustments to meet with current requirements.

Regarding finances, the committee is concerned that expenditure is far ahead of income. It is clear that over

recent years the Branch has been using up its reserves, and that steps need to be taken to redress the balance. In the short term, the problem will be addressed by putting up fees for classes and dances, though by quite small amounts. All our dances will continue to use 'live' music, but with a higher proportion of smaller bands and single musicians, thus reducing expenditure. But in the longer term the balance will be redressed most effectively by getting more people to take part in both classes and dances, and all members are asked to do what they can to encourage this.

Now for a few noteworthy future events. No doubt Peter Clarke's half day school on 20th September will be excellent - to be held at Adel Methodist Church Hall owing to the non-availability of West Park on that afternoon. The AGM on 18th October will be in all your diaries, not only because of the AGM but also because of the 'new music' of Keith Smith and James Gray, two rising stars on violin and piano/keyboard, and Alan Horsfall's first stint as MC for a Branch dance. # St Andrews 2003

It seemed very early in July when Summer School started this year. The numbers were low for the first week but this made social dancing more comfortable. As the weeks progressed the numbers gradually increased and the fourth week was full. This year there was a noticeable lack of North Americans and far fewer lapanese attending than last year when they made up almost a third of the attendees.

#### Week 1

Avis and Brenda were teaching, Brenda Pattison and Jean Nuttall were dancing and they were joined for their first visit by Christina Quirke and Angela Welsh.

Apart from the usual morning classes and evening social dancing there were 'walk throughs' and technique sessions in the afternoons – hardly time to go to the beach unless you were an early morning swimmer (and there were at least two).

On the first Monday the dancing was to Fiddlers 3 + 2 and they were pure

magic. The recordings they made for the Society give a pale impression of what they produced on that first evening. The three fiddlers play in unison backed by an accordion and piano. Don't ever miss the chance to dance to them as they are wonderful.

New additional sessions were introduced this summer. Derek Haynes took a very interesting couple of hours on devising dances. He talked a lot of sense about using traditional figures. The class was divided into two sets and were asked to devise a dance incorporating a reel of three or four, a wheel or circle and rights and lefts (half figures could be used if desired). It was amazing how two very different dances emerged and they were duly danced at the Ceilidh on Friday night.

David Cunningham also gave us an insight into how a CD is made from the very first letter of enquiry through to the finished CD ready for sale. No wonder they cost so much to produce initially – none of us realised the

amount of time and work that follows a recording.

#### Week 2

There was a big change over of dancers and this brought Betty Sumpton, Sandra Webber and Jennifer Edmondson to join the two Brendas and Avis who were already there.

The musicians' course led by Mo Rutherford ran parallel to the dancing one. There was another session on devising dances and Alistair MacFadyen came to give another of his fascinating talks about the style and development of Scottish Country dancing. His talks are full of historical facts plus many amusing

anecdotes and his sense of timing is perfect. He must have been a wonderful lecturer to have had at university!

Jennifer was able to take part in the ladies' step demonstration on Thursday night in the Younger Hall. Five young ladies danced The Lilt and it looked very good.

Friday gave us a session with Jennifer Wilson playing and advising some of the musicians in a class situation. It meant doing most things three times through to give different musicians the chance to play. The volunteer class was patient and learnt that playing for Scottish Country dancing is not just playing the black dots! To round off the afternoon we were treated to Jennifer's playing of a set of hornpipes for The Sailor. The session went so quickly that there was no time to deal with strathspeys - hopefully next time.

The music for the Saturday evening was the icing on the cake for the first fortnight. With band leaders David Cunningham, George Meikle and Neil Copland playing alongside class musicians ludith Linton. Sheena Sturrock and Fred Moyes plus more from the musicians' course, the music had to be good. Along with the wonderful sprung floor of the Younger Hall (and if you've never experienced that you should) and lots of encores for the special 'band' to play their tunes again it was a fitting end to the first fortnight.

#### Weeks 3 & 4

Derek Kendall and Yvonne Tredgett became the Leeds representatives for week 3 and were joined by Jean Morrison and Alice Stainer for the last one. It was good to see Alice back dancing again and looking

so well. She hopes to be back with us again in the autumn. She was chosen for the mixed team demonstration on the last Thursday and danced The Thistle with the ladies' step class. Both the mixed and ladies' dances went very well but it was sad to see only two men and eight women in the men's highland dancing.

The end of the course saw the exams as the finale to the Prelim and Teacher's Certificate classes during the second fortnight. The Prelim class was truly international with 1 Russian, 1 Japanese, 1 Chinese, 3 Germans, 2 North Americans and the remaining 7 from the UK representing the worldwide spread of Scottish Country dancing.

Both fortnights had a spate of fire alarms this year.
Week 1 had several but luckily during the day.
Week 3 was less fortunate with one of theirs going off just after midnight.

The end of the month

brought the end of Johan MacLean's four years as Director of Summer School. She has changed the format gradually during her directorship by introducing new afternoon sessions and this year some interesting talks along with special extras to celebrate the 80th year of the society. We wish her well in her retirement and look forward to seeing her back teaching when Linda Gaul takes over next year.

#### **Footnote**

Book 43 arrived early (well actually on time) this year but as with most things something else didn't arrive. The CD is not yet available but should any of you play the music, the correction of the barring for some of the 40 bar dances is available from Brenda Burnell

1-8 1's lead down for three, back up for three and cast to second place. Second couple step up on bars 7 and 8.

9-12 1's cross right down below 3's and cast up round 3's.

13-16 1's cross right up between the 2's and cast to 2nd place, in the middle, facing each other. 3's dance in on bar 16, ready for...

17-24 1's & 3's poussette

25-32 2's, 3's & 1's six-hands-round and back

Repeat from new position

Tune: Itchy Fingers (Trad)

This dance was devised January 2003 by Malcolm Frost to celebrate Graeme Baranyai's eighteenth birthday.

On 25th January 1999 Sandy Dunleavy of Radio York generously arranged for Graeme to pipe, on air, with Duncan McKay of "The Highlanders" as part her special "Burns" programme

The tune is one of Graeme's favourites

Note:

Bars 9-16 require considerable flight. In particular, the 1st lady should be starting to cross up between the 2nd couple at the end of bar 12 so that she does not impede her partner who has to be in 2nd place, in the middle of the set on bar 16, with sufficient time to adjust his balance to start the poussette.

# Where Does the Money Go?

Because Branch Socials have been consistently losing money over the past two years, The Committee has reluctantly decided to increase admission charges. We would like to outline the cost of running a social so that you will understand why this price rise is necessary.

#### **Fixed Cost**

Hire of the hall £75.00 Refreshments £15.00 Security man £50.00 Total £140.00

The Variable Cost is the price of live music.

As a rough guide, it is £100 per player plus expenses depending upon how far they have to travel. So a three-piece can cost between £300 and £400, making the cost of a dance between £440 and £540 respectively.

This means that in order to cover the cost of a band dance, we require between 75 and 90 dancers at £6.00 per person. On a number of occasions last season we did not reach the lower number so we lost money on most occasions as we were charging £5.00 admission.

You can see from these figures that we need the support of our members if we are to continue to have the high quality bands we are accustomed to. The alternative is to use more single musicians and only have a band two or three times a year.

### The lack of support at the socials poses a number of questions:

Should we make the programmes more attractive to newer dancers?

Are the programmes perceived as too straightforward? Should we talk through the dances?

Do we run too many Socials?

Are members happy with the venue?

The Chairman Don Andrews would value any ideas you have on how to improve attendance at Branch Socials.

### **Branch Constitution**

The proposal for the revised constitution is included in the AGM agenda.

Copies of the current (1997) constitution were circulated with the winter Newsletter, and the proposed revisions were published in the spring Newsletter, with a request for observations, comments or amendments.

Two proposals for amendments were submitted;

1. That the quorum be reduced to 20% of the membership, or 20 members, whichever shall be lesser. Reason: to allow business to be transacted in the event of a low attendance.

The committee agreed that this amendment be included in the proposal.

2. That husband and wife should not be permitted to serve on the committee together.

The committee took the view that this amendment should not be included.

The proposal before the AGM is the proposal as published in the spring Newsletter, plus item 1 above.

Any further amendments will be received, in writing, by 1st October 2003. Amendments will not be received after that date. They should be submitted to the Branch secretary.

At the AGM, any amendments received on or before October 1st will be put to the meeting and voted on first. Then a vote will be taken on the proposal, as amended.

To be approved, any additional amendments and the proposal must receive the vote of not less than two thirds of the members present and entitled to vote. ( XII Alteration of Constitution).
